- (i) Discuss and consider approving \$1,500 from the City's Sustainable Reserve Program for energy audits and analysis of six downtown Oberlin businesses.

Motion to approve \$1500 from the City's Sustainable Reserve Program for energy audits and analysis of six downtown businesses was moved by Mucciolo and seconded by Meadows.

Norenberg stated that included in Council's packet was a report outlining staff recommendations to approve a request for \$1500 from the Sustainable Reserve Fund for the above stated purpose. If approved by Council this would be funded by the Sustainable Reserve Fund, the Oberlin Project, and Oberlin Main Street and Chamber. He remarked that staff members Doug McMillan, Energy Services and Sustainability Manager and Electric Director Steve Dupee were in attendance along with Oberlin College Student, Elizabeth Campbell, and Oberlin Main Street Director Scott Schell, to further discuss the matter. Attached to the report was the policy, regarding the Sustainable Reserve Program, which outlined the approval process for receiving sustainable reserve funds.

Introductory remarks were heard from Elizabeth Campbell a senior at Oberlin College majoring in Environmental Studies. She said this winter term project is a part of her capstone activity for her Environmental Studies major. It entails going to six downtown businesses and creating an energy efficiency audit. This data would be shipped to a business in Cleveland called Osborne Engineering who will compile the information into a report summary. These summaries will be reviewed to identify applicable financial incentives offered through the Efficiency Smart Program. An action plan would then be recommended for the businesses in order to promote savings and energy efficiency.

Scott Schell, Oberlin Main Street Department noted that Ms. Campbell was also the Main Street Organization's Bonner Center Student. He stated that when she first started talking about a winter term project, she was having some problems coming up with a winter term topic and he suggested that since she was becoming more familiar with the downtown area maybe they could do a case study project. The study could be used to focus on potential efficiency improvements that could be made to some of their larger businesses downtown. This information could be used as a promotional and educational tool to talk to other businesses downtown and used to help encourage more energy efficiency improvements. Schell commended Ms. Campbell for wanting to take on this undertaking and supported her efforts.

McMillan said he tried to get tenants/landowners in the downtown area to look at energy efficiency but has had little response. It has been one of his goals to see what they can do especially with the Efficiency Smart Program and this study will help. He further remarked that the total initiative cost would be \$3,000. If approved, a purchase order will be cut by the City for the full amount. Of this amount, OMLPS will use \$1500 from the Sustainable Reserve Program funds, the remaining balance would later be reimbursed to the City by Oberlin Main Street/Chamber and the Oberlin Project.

Broadwell asked who the sixth business would be since only five had been listed on the application form. Campbell remarked that they had approached Gibson but the owner declined. A request has been made to Simply Elegant Candle Shop, but a response is pending.

Broadwell asked how much was in the SRP fund at this time. Dupee remarked that there was about \$268,000 in the fund and of that amount \$25,000 had been budgeted for this year. The fund had accumulated a lot of revenue over the past two years as a result of landfill gas REC sales to our third party investor – owned utilities.

Rimbert asked Dupee to elaborate on how the fund had grown to \$268,000 over the past two years. Dupee remarked that in 2010 Council approved the sale of Renewable Energy Credits from two of the City's landfill

Broadwell asked if the only thing left to do on the roof was to install the shingles. Baumann concurred.

Rimbert asked if this ordinance needed to be approved on emergency. Baumann remarked that since the contractors were already beyond the interim completion date and since there weren't any cost implications he would prefer emergency passage.

Colaso, ACM/HRA provided an update on the Underground Railroad Center Project. She noted that the URCIT's organization sub – team has been very busy working on the planning that goes into the long term operations and programming. They have a Fundraising sub – team who has started the silent fund raising campaign which with City Council's, allowed them to rehabilitate and stabilize the exterior of the Gasholder Building. The planning sub-team has been working on both the exterior renovation plan and was now helping to give the entire team direction to the architect regarding upcoming site work and the eventual internal renovation. Colaso remarked that a year ago at this time they were planning a very special Martin Luther King Jr. Day celebration over at the gasholder site called "Prison, Power, Peace" the fund- raising had really just begun. A lot has been accomplished to come up with the \$80,000 match to get them where they are now. Things that are going to be happening this spring will include: the installation of the synthetic slated shingles and construction crews will begin the task of rehabbing the 120 year brick work that makes up the gasholder structure façade. By the summer of 2012 the Gasholder building will hopefully look as good as new and beyond that the remainder of the progress of this project is contingent upon fund raising effort. She encouraged the community to get involved in this project. The commission meeting dates and times were currently the second Thursday of each month at 3:00 p.m. at City Hall. In addition, Colaso announced that this Friday night during half time at the Oberlin High School Varsity Basketball game there would be a presentation of Underground Railroad themed murals to the Underground Railroad Center Implementation Team. It was over a year ago that the City Manager had an idea of having a group of young artists create Murals for the Underground Railroad Center. It began with Lorna Kretchmar and has now carried on to her successor. They are estimating halftime to begin at about 8:15 p.m. and they encourage the public to attend.

Motion to suspend the rules requiring three readings and to elevate the ordinance to an emergency was moved by Mucciolo and seconded by Meadows.

President Rimbert asked that the purpose of the emergency be stated in the motion as well. Mucciolo asked if it were already written in the ordinance then why was there a need to state it in the motion.

The Law Director remarked that when a motion is passed on emergency the reason for passing it on emergency should be stated. Since this has already been written as an emergency, the most appropriate way to present the motion is to quote the emergency language provided in Section 3, of the ordinance. If Council decided to use its own language then the ordinance would need to be revised to reflect the reason.

Mucciolo restated the motion as follows:

Motion to suspend the rules requiring three readings and to elevate the ordinance to an emergency to allow for timely contract extension of a project under construction" and shall take effect immediately upon passage was moved by Mucciolo and seconded by Broadwell.

- Meadows remarked that she attended the Martin Luther King Jr. event held at Finney Chapel on Sunday, January 15, 2012 at 5 p.m. themed “The Language of the Unheard”. She advised that the event was sponsored by Oberlin College and was very well coordinated. It was nice to see an event of that kind in Oberlin and it was well attended.

Broadwell concurred with remarks from Meadows and added that he would like to see this type of event every year in honor of Martin Luther King Jr. He added that on Monday, January 16, 2012 he attended the “Rededication of the Dream” ceremony at the Martin Luther King Jr. Park, where he read the proclamation read earlier by Elizabeth Meadows in observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day. He added that there was a lot of participation by young people at this event as could be seen in today’s edition of the Chronicle Telegram.

City Manager Norenberg concurred with comments from both Meadows and Broadwell. He stated that the planning committee for the event that was held on Sunday at Finney Chapel included people from a number of community churches, the school district, and other community organizations - it really was a community wide effort. It was the second year that they held this event on Sunday evening and it would only get better and grow. A lot of people were really enthusiastic about the event this year and had not realized that a similar event had been held last year. The hope was to continue to build on that momentum.

7. CITY MANAGER’S REPORT:

Several updates were mentioned by the City Manager, where he:

- Reminded Council about the retreat on February 4, 2012.
- Read a correspondence from the Lorain County Chamber of Commerce inviting Council members to a meeting on January 24th, at the Spitzer Center, regarding the feasibility of centralized waste water treatment and collection in the Northern part of the county.
- Provided an update on his Saturday morning meeting with residence at Concord Manor along with Linda Arbogast. He noted that he had received a question from a resident regarding the safety of water as a result of the gasoline leak in Wellington. Norenberg confirmed that the City water was safe to drink.
- Announced former Councilmember, Jim White’s, memorial service will be held on March 10th, at 2:00 p.m., at First Church in Oberlin.
- Announced that he had attended the Local Government Innovation Fund Information Session this afternoon over at Tri- C (East) in Warrensville Heights. They explained the new LGIF that provides for loans as well as grants for local governments who are collaborating with other local entities.
- Remarked on an article on social media in the business section of the Cleveland Plain Dealer. A copy will be provided to Council members in Friday’s packet.
